Patty Jenkins quoted in an interview about how she never viewed Wonder Woman as a dark character which is shown in the start and the last parts of the movie saying, "I came in very definitively only wanting it [to have a lighter tone]. The choice of me [as director] became the choice for that tone. [Making a gritty Wonder Woman] probably was a conversation, and I peripherally heard of some of that. I always believed that Wonder Woman is not dark. If ever there's a place for a dark superhero, great. Do it. But that's not Wonder Woman to me. The

A word about the fighting: there's a lot of flinging and lassoing, but not as much classic combat, when people punch each other. The Comics counterpart also shows women's place in the war working in the background but somewhat uplifting as a lot of women started working due to the unemployment caused by the war. The guys in the film treat her with sexism and sexualization. Several times in London, the subject of her beauty came up. Even though there is a feminist narrative to the movie throughout its shown out in a very subtle manner and not thrown out at the audience as a message. Another part of the movie that is intriguing is how the first few minutes of the movie is portrayed as such that Diana in the present times is telling her story as a first person narrative, and everything is from her point of view from an audience perspective. A first person narrative in my opinion always leaves a sense of bias and not a lot of external factors contribute to it, but the transition of narrative is done beautifully throughout the movie as after a few minutes even though Diana is telling her story the events are shown in a very traditional film style as a 3rd person point of view which leaves a lot of external factors affecting the story and the messages its putting out while making it entertaining which is still the first priority of any film maker. But during the end of the movie the narrative is switched back to a first person narrative where Diana is again telling her story while remembering Steve and her memories of the war and points out her beliefs and a positive opinion on her understanding of humankind which ends the movie on a very lighter and warmer note.

Jenkins and her collaborators created a Wonder Woman film that is inspiring, blistering, and compassionate, in ways that honor what has made this character an icon and do justice to her huge past achievements.
